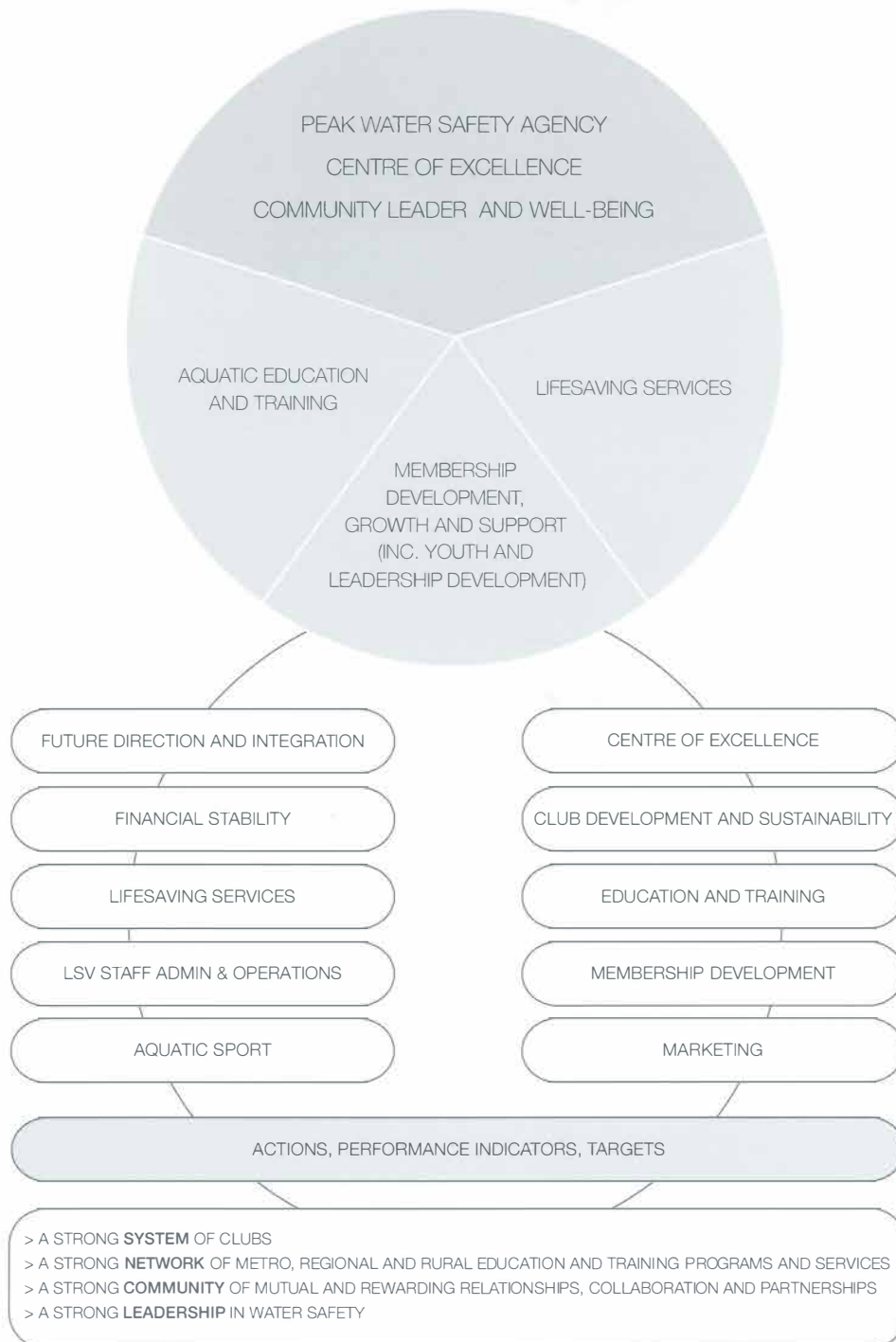

Chairman's Report



When this Annual Report is presented to Life Saving Victoria's Annual General Meeting in late November 2006, the task of creating Life Saving Victoria, through a merger of Surf Life Saving and Royal Life Saving in Victoria, will be effectively complete. This historic and significant step warrants comment, in an historical context.

Both 'Royal' and 'Surf' have proud histories of service to the Victorian community over many years. Lifesaving requires dedicated, determined and selfless service commitment to the community by our thousands of volunteers. This commitment is evident not only 'on patrol' and in performing rescues, but in the commitment to the training regimes and education programs which underpin the activities necessary for lifesaving 'core functions' to be carried out. Often we fail to recognise the commitment to the less obvious but extraordinarily time consuming administration, training and fundraising activities.

Making the 'brave' decision to create Life Saving Victoria, then doing all the 'hard yards' necessary to actually see it successfully completed, likewise has required dedication, determination and selfless commitment by many, led by the LSV Board.

The objective of the leaders of lifesaving in Victoria, in initiating, and then guiding the implementation of this decision, was not simply to create one organisation from two. Rather, it was to create Victoria's single, authoritative, aquatic safety organisation, taking its place as part of Victoria's 'emergency services family'.

What this means, in practical terms, is that we are better placed to save Victorian lives, specifically through:

- > the provision of a well trained and coordinated patrol and rescue service
- > the setting of standards for Victoria's aquatic environment
- > our water safety and survival programs and resources for the community and generally making our beaches and inland waterways a safe place to have fun.

Chief Executive's Overview



It gives me great pleasure to present the second Life Saving Victoria (LSV) Annual Report. It has been a year of consolidating processes and procedures, whilst at the same time as noted below, conducting a number of very significant lifesaving events.

If we look back it has been a year in which the workloads for many have been substantial and whilst there is unlikely to be any real let up in the foreseeable future, we have now implemented an organisation with the capability to demonstrate that the Victorian community, through LSV, is able to play a comprehensive role in delivering water safety programs and services.

In looking forward and subject to discussions with a supportive government infrastructure, we aim to take advantage of the potential created by the introduction of LSV, to create a world class government/community partnership. This partnership, whilst focusing on aquatic safety would be an outstanding example of both parties working together to ensure the sum of the combined effort is more than the two working individually.

In moving to this position LSV has continued to undertake the traditional royal and surf lifesaving activities throughout the 2005/06 year. The highlights of this activity are noted here:

Highlights for 2005/06

- > Conduct of the "best ever" World Life Saving Championships (Rescue 2006) at Geelong and Lorne.
- > Completion of the transfer of all the assets and activities from RLSSAV and SLSV to LSV.
- > A record 140,520 children received water safety contact through LSV.
- > Life Membership given to Michael Bell, John Pettigrove, Roy Ricca, Scott Tannahil and John Waters.
- > Construction of the new Education, Training and Administration Facility began.
- > Development of LSV's Strategic Framework.
- > The Australian Water Safety Councils endorsement of the LSV produced Aquatic and Recreational Signage Style Manual as the national standard.
- > Reduction in the drowning rate over the last ten years from 1.35 per 100,000 population to .81.

It is also pleasing to note that whilst LSV could have been distracted with the merger process and the regular changes in administration procedures and facilities in recent years, it has continued to play its role in reducing the drowning toll. It is the principle reason for our existence and so whilst 41 drownings for the year is far too many, it is encouraging to see the rate per 100,000 dropping from 1.35 ten years ago to .94 five years ago and now to be .81.

For many who have worked tirelessly to introduce the merger, it was an unexpected bonus that whilst hosting the 2006 World Life Saving Championships (Rescue 2006), the Victorian aquatic safety delivery model was endorsed whole heartedly by the international life saving community. Given Rescue 2006 was generally considered to be the best ever life saving championships it was a period in which LSV could take great pride in its efforts. For their assistance in achieving this result we note the input from DHL, the State Government, Victorian Major Events, the City of Greater Geelong and the South Barwon Shire.

We will deal with the new facility more in next years report but should note that after many years in the planning stage, this was the year that it finally became bricks and mortar or at least glass and wood. As construction continued, it was evident that we will have a facility of which all lifesavers will be justifiably proud, one which for the first time will allow us to address our higher level community and member education and training needs.

From a financial perspective, once the clutter associated with new building funding is taken out, it was satisfying to see the organisation finish the year with a small surplus. Unfortunately, given the nature of our activity, many income sources (sponsorship,

fundraising, grants etc) are negotiated after the financial year has begun, so delivering a positive result requires a constant monitoring of our services and programs not only from a qualitative perspective but also in a financial sense.

It would be impossible to achieve our stated goals without the support of many individuals and organisations. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Minister for Police and Emergency Services, the Hon Tim Holding, the Minister for Sport and Recreation the Hon Justin Madden, the Commissioner for Emergency Services Bruce Esplin and the various staff of the Office of the Emergency Services Commissioner, our many sponsors as noted elsewhere in this report, contributors to the new facility (more about those next year), the LSV Directors, officers, members, the very diligent staff and the two national life saving bodies.

Finally, as we move towards our first election of a President, Dr Michael Kennedy will be stepping down as the Independent Chair of LSV. I would like to note both my own personal and the organisation's appreciation of his professionalism and thoughtful guidance as we have moved through the introductory phase of LSV.

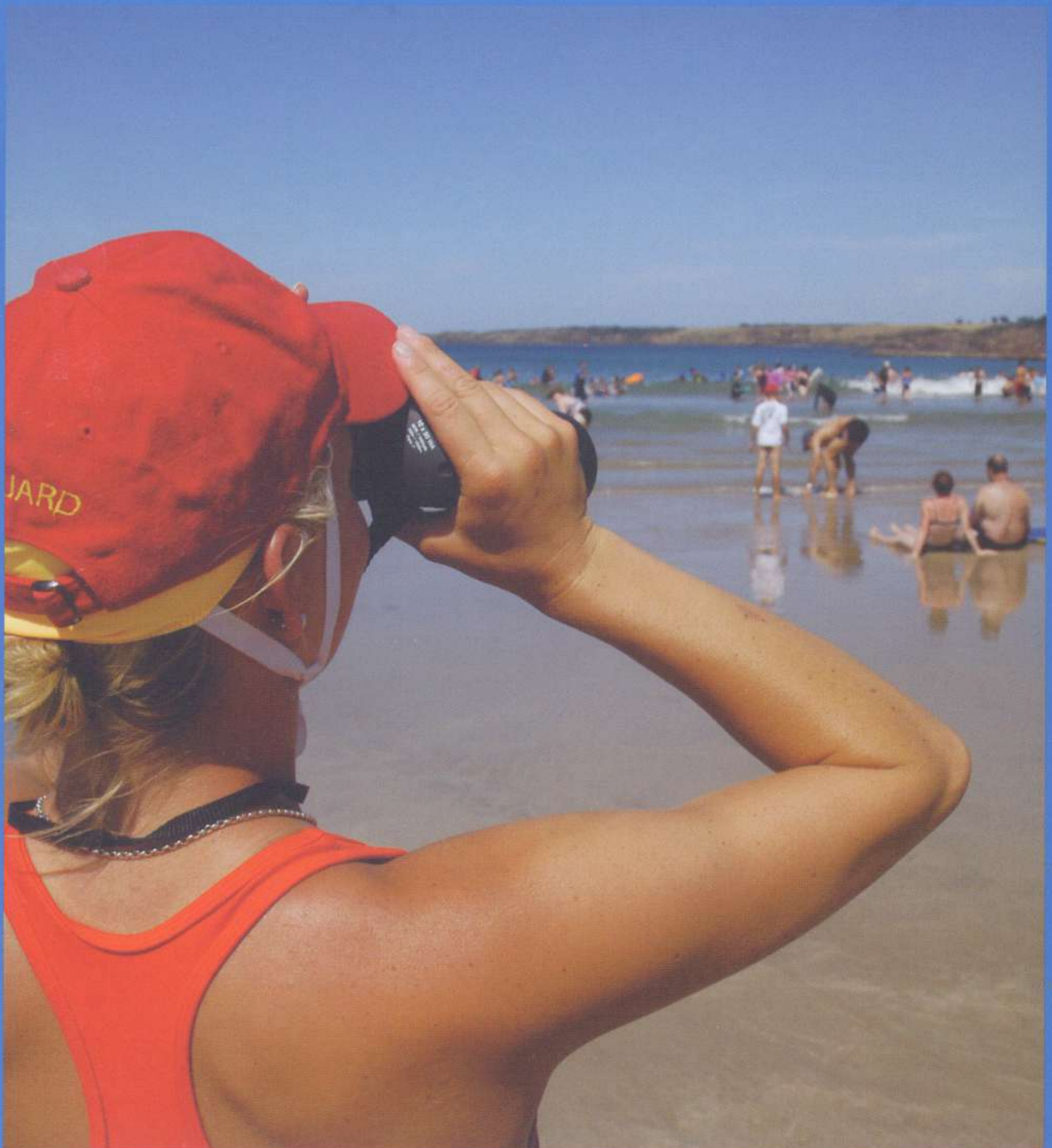

Lifesaving Operations

Life Saving Victoria is the State's peak beach safety and rescue authority. 65 beaches are patrolled every summer along our coastline from Mallacoota in the east to Portland in the west.





Volunteer Lifesaving Services

This season saw a huge increase in the demand placed upon Victoria's lifesaving services. Crowds flocked to the beach in record numbers due to the hot weather during the season's holidays and weekends. These conditions, coupled with unusually large surf for most of the summer period, resulted in a greater need for lifesavers across Victoria's beaches.

The core role of patrolling beaches has been extended further for several clubs with a range of responses outside of hours and the development of additional services. Both lifesaving clubs and Life Saving Victoria have been building relationships not only with other emergency service providers but also the extended community as part of a service 'beyond the flags'.

Once again the lifesavers of Victoria rose to the occasion, and their leadership, dedication and motivation remain remarkable.

Lifesaving Communications Network

Significant work has taken place in managing the roll out of a communications infrastructure upgrade. Stage one is planned to be implemented in time for the forthcoming season resulting in all life saving services in Victoria having radio communications with our communications hub, Life Saving Command. This project will see clubs and community benefit from considerable improvements in efficiency, resource management and member safety by utilising the expert services of personnel at Command to coordinate and support in any rescue and response activity. Life Saving Command will have its own rebirth in new state of the art facilities to be installed at Life Saving Victoria's Port Melbourne premises.

With expenditure already totalling \$115,000, the project would not have been possible without the funding and in-kind support of the Office of the Emergency Services Commissioner, Bureau of Emergency Services Telecommunications, Emergency Services Telecommunications Authority, Telstra, Esso, Emergency Management Australia, AA Radio, Alcoa, British Aerospace and the Country Fire Authority.

Professional Beach Lifeguard Services

With the support of the Office of Emergency Services Commissioner, Contributing Councils, Local Foreshore Committees, Parks Victoria, DHL and Life Saving Clubs, the provision of paid Lifeguards at 31 of the States most popular and/or dangerous beaches continued from Mallacoota in the east to Port Fairy in the west.

Assistance was also provided to the volunteer service at Kennett River during the main holiday period and Geelong for the entire season.

The extended periods at Woolamai, Portsea, Ocean Grove, Torquay, Anglesea, Lorne and the Pool Complex at Eastern Beach in Geelong continue to be well received by the general public especially at Lorne and Torquay with the service being provided from mid November until the end of February.

This past summer, lifeguards rescued 443 people and treated well over 500 first aid cases as well as locating over 100 lost children at various beaches.

Further support by City of Greater Geelong will see the service extended to include Bancoora, beginning December 2006 and a submission has also been

put to Wellington Shire Council to support a service at Woodside Beach.

It should be noted that these services could not be provided without the ongoing support and endeavours of clubs with infrastructure support and in encouraging members to 'step up' and become a professional lifeguard. Club benefits range from member up-skilling and experience to community support in providing a daily service.

Event Lifeguard Services

The request for external Event Lifeguard Services continued to expand in providing water safety and first aid services for some of Victoria's premier events including:

- > 2006 Commonwealth Games
- > Rowing Regattas
- > Chinese New Year Events
- > Aerobic Championships
- > Film Shoots
- > Dragon Boat Racing
- > Private Functions
- > School/University Camps and Excursions
- > Boating Industry Association Events

The requests for professional lifeguards continues to grow, showing that their experience and expertise is well recognised in the community.

Lifesaving Operations

Commonwealth Games Services

Across the Commonwealth Games period a number of additional services were mounted by Life Saving Victoria in anticipation of the increased number of visitors to the State.

The increased services were provided at six strategic high risk coastal locations between the dates of March 6th and March 31st. The number of rescues and first aid cases certainly demonstrated the importance of having the lifeguards on duty at these beaches, being Anglesea, Lorne, Ocean Grove, Portsea, Torquay and Woolamai. At Anglesea, two of those rescued were from one of the visiting Commonwealth Games teams. Collectively these beaches performed twenty six rescues, forty one first aid cases (four of which required further hospital treatment) and 2,239 preventative actions. They provided services to approximately 75,000 beach visitors.

The additional services were also fielded at the three major Melbourne Bayside locations of St Kilda, Elwood and Port Melbourne for the Games from the 14th through to the 24th of March. The service was well utilised providing protection for 21,210 beach visitors.

187 preventative actions and seven minor first aid cases were recorded for the area.

The final component was the support services which operated from the 11th to 26th March. Two rapid response RWCs (jet skis) patrolled the area between Elwood and Williamstown, including Docklands and Southbank. The craft were equipped with a range of rescue and medical equipment, and they conducted approximately one hundred preventative actions along with a rescue. Preventative actions were carried out with beach users and power craft users alike, with the service being extremely well received.

Support Services

Life Saving Victoria support services which integrate with volunteer lifesaving and lifeguard services has continued its rapid expansion over the past season. The addition of such support services has improved volunteer numbers and member retention within lifesaving clubs.

Other highlights include the progression of the Gippsland Marine Rescue services with two 'offshore' RWCs (jet skis) at Seaspray to work in conjunction with a new offshore rigid hull inflatable boat at Woodside. Portland also saw their offshore rescue boat replaced with a new, high performance

vessel. The launch of a similar service at Mallacoota is imminent with the boat's construction complete.

It was pleasing to see the continued integration of the Southern Peninsula Rescue Squad with Life Saving Victoria. In addition to their usual response activities, regular training was conducted with clubs to ensure professional and seamless interaction.

- > rescues increased 77%
- > first aid cases increased 15%

Club Administration and Development

The 2005–2006 Season once again saw high administrative demands placed on club personnel and resources.

In its second year, the club support program continued to assist struggling clubs with developing business plans, intensive training of club personnel and general administrative support. The most significant achievement saw two clubs able to provide newly trained patrols on their beaches from within their own club membership.



Staff continued to ensure that duplication of data was not requested from clubs and this year's Annual Summary Returns showed the rate of return by the closing date was 65%, an improvement of 15% over last year.

The inaugural Life Saving Victoria President's Forum held in October 2005 was well supported with club presidents given the opportunity to be brought up to date with the changes occurring within Life Saving Victoria and to network with each other. Presidents who attended the International Lifesaving Conference in Geelong in February 2006 reported it a worthwhile and informative experience, inspiring a number to continue on in their roles with new ideas, energy and enthusiasm.

Regional Forums held after the completion of the patrol season highlighted a number of issues, a major one being that although clubs are keen to have their voices heard there appears to be only a small number that actually attend these sessions. Again this has left us with the question of how can we improve the services we offer and the manner in which we offer them. We thank the members who gave their time and made the effort to attend these forums for their contributions.

The most significant administrative challenge of the year was the implementation of the national member database 'Surfguard'. Many clubs faced the transition with enthusiasm and embraced the concept, with some club administrators spending numerous hours updating their membership data to ensure its accuracy – well done on a tremendous effort by these people. As we have worked through the bugs and anomalies 'Surfguard' has proven to be an effective tool for handling membership contact details and awards, and with the roll out of further modules, especially the patrol module, clubs will be able to better manage their membership and patrols for the next season.

We continue to develop resources for club use, with the scheduled release of induction and recruitment kits prior to the next patrol season. Work is in hand on updating the State's website with improved navigation and more web-based data collection.



Training Services

Life Saving Victoria aims to train all Victorians to be Lifesavers.





Community Lifesaving

During the 2005/2006 period Life Saving Victoria's training unit has continued to expand its reach in the provision of quality training for both the community and aquatic industry sectors. We have also continued our vital training alliance with the Department of Human Services in delivering first aid and resuscitation programs across the State.

Life Saving Victoria continues to clearly be the number one provider of training for the aquatics industry with its flagship the RLSSA Pool Lifeguard award. This 2005/2006 period again has seen in excess of 3,000 Pool Lifeguards trained.

LSV trained well over 20,000 people amongst our community in the skills of CPR and First Aid, which again is an increase on last year. This also goes a long way to helping achieve one of Life Saving Victoria's goals in providing safer aquatic venues across Victoria.

RLSSA – Senior First Aid Training

With the increasing focus on safety in the workplace both our full and update First Aid programs continue to grow in popularity. Life Saving Victoria has continued to develop its flexible First Aid program which has been successfully introduced into group training programs.

RLSSA – Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)

CPR courses continue to be a popular training option for a wide range of Victorians from school students through to many parts of the aquatic and broader industries. Our valued individual Examiners continue to promote recognised CPR training to schools and community groups with over 9,000 participants gaining formal qualifications.

Special thanks goes to the many casual staff that have assisted with over 1,000 training courses delivered across Victoria during the 2005/2006 period.

Thanks also go to the Community Lifesaving team who have provided the ongoing support and customer service to all our valued clients.

State Trainers and Assessors Conference

The bi-annual State Trainers and Assessors Conference was again held at the Somers School Camp from the 2nd to the 4th of September. The conference saw more than 130 trainers and assessors from around the State come together to network, be updated in the use of the latest training and assessment resources and participate in professional development activities.

Certificate II in Public Safety (Aquatic Rescue)

Life Saving Victoria completed the roll out of the Certificate II in Public Safety (Aquatic Rescue), with all current members now holding this nationally recognised qualification. The Certificate II in Public Safety (Aquatic Rescue) aligns to the SLSA Bronze Medallion. Existing members completed an upgrade through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) and additional assessment during the annual proficiency process. New members are able to complete the qualification along with the SLSA Bronze Medallion.

New Training Resources

Life Saving Victoria personnel working in conjunction with SLSA working groups have been able to release new training resources for several core lifesaving awards including the Bronze Medallion, Senior First Aid, Spinal Management Certificate, Advanced Resuscitation Certificate, and Defibrillation Certificate.

Spinal Management Course

SLSA has introduced a new award for patrolling lifesavers, the 'Spinal Management Certificate', to give members a more comprehensive set of skills in dealing with the spinal injuries that occur at the beach and in the water. Life Saving Victoria is well prepared for the roll out of this new qualification in the coming season with over thirty facilitators already trained and endorsed to run the course.

Awards Review

This year the majority of club member awards achieved remained the same, with some excellent numbers achieved in the roll out of the Defibrillation Certificate. The club training network is set up well for the coming season with these machines and many new course facilitators.

Thank you to all trainers and assessors who have helped make the transition into a registered training organisation so successful. Their patience, understanding and enthusiasm have been unsurpassed and the result has been a hugely successful season.

During the year, Life Saving Victoria worked towards and completed all of the requirements to become a new Registered Training Organisation. In the future all training programs will be delivered under this new RTO.

Education

Life Saving Victoria's education department plays a vital role in aquatic safety, through the provision of a wide range of educative programs that help students, teachers and the community learn important water safety and lifesaving skills.





Boating Safety for Kids Essential to Community Education and Safety!

The Boating Safety for Kids program is designed to educate grade 5 & 6 students in the safety considerations when boating on any waterway. In the programs second year 10,000 students from across the State have been visited by Life Saving Victoria with the enthusiasm and feedback from both students and teachers being extremely positive.

To accompany the program, well developed teacher and student resources make Boating Safety for Kids a worthwhile investment for students boating and water safety knowledge.

The interactive in-class session is often accompanied by a practical boating session with Yachting Victoria, a partner in the program. This session further develops the students awareness and skills around boats and water safety.

In 2006-07, with grant assistance from Marine Safety Victoria, Life Saving Victoria and Yachting Victoria hope to reach over 15,000 students and 25,000 students respectively. This will assist in giving students a practical experience and understanding of potential dangers in, on and around the waterways.

Regional Kids Enjoy the Open Water Program

Life Saving Victoria's Open Water Learning Experience (OWLE) which is supported by the Play It Safe by the Water campaign was a huge success over the 2005-2006 summer with 7,262 children participating in the program. New programs in Kerang, Bendigo, Wangaratta and Colac have confirmed the program as one of the leading practical water safety programs in regional Victoria.

The OWLE teaches students important water safety skills and awareness around their local waterways, in the following skills:

- Body Boarding
- The correct use of PFD's
- DRABC Awareness
- Rescues (Rope)
- Danger Awareness (Primary)
- Ski paddling (Secondary)

It is hoped with the right support we can further develop the program in other areas of the State and continue the programs success in areas such as Geelong, Shepparton, Echuca, Mildura and the Latrobe Valley.

TELEGAMES Getting Students Active while Learning Lifesaving Skills

Just over 180 students participated in the Victorian Schools Pool Lifesaving TELEGAMES, a modified Pool Lifesaving event which enables every student involved to learn potentially lifesaving skills while getting active, having fun and being part of a team.

The concept of TELEGAMES is to allow students and schools to participate in a State wide competition which is held in each of their local areas. This is made possible via Telecommunications such as internet results and hence the name 'TELE - GAMES'.

With a blend of well-performed individuals and team results Cowes Primary School in Phillip Island were the 2005 TELEGAMES champions managing to out perform the 2004 winners, Irymple Secondary College from the Sunraysia District.

This year we aim to reach over 200 students State wide through participation in the TELEGAMES event. Who will be the winner?

Beach to Bush Well Received Again!

Many families living in regional Victoria choose the summer holidays as a time to travel to the coast to relax and enjoy their break.

However, many families are unaware of the potential dangers of recreating in an unfamiliar environment or waterway such as the beach. This is why Life Saving Victoria sends their trained Lifeguards from the Beach to the Bush, to ensure that a number of communities across regional Victoria are taught key water safety messages before going on holiday.

Over 10,000 primary school students from regional Victoria were visited by Lifesavers who spent time educating students on the potential dangers at the beach, the role of a lifesaver and how to make their visits to the beach safe but fun.

Charlotte Sowerby, a Lifesaver from Point Leo Surf Life Saving Club, taught over 2,500 kids in four weeks, proving her dedication to both patrolling and educating the wider community. Areas visited included - South and East Gippsland, Latrobe Valley, Central Victoria, Sunraysia District, Wimmera, Bendigo, Ballarat and the Western region.

Meet a Lifeguard Sweeps Through Melbourne

Flexibility is a key element of the Meet a Lifeguard program allowing a diverse range of people to benefit from important lifesaving messages. Most popular in the warmer months,

the year round program educated people throughout Victoria in 2005/06. Visiting many new schools and community groups such as Delfin – Lend Lease and the Australian Multicultural Education Services (AMES), Meet a Lifeguard ensures participants receive information to make safe aquatic related decisions when enjoying the inland, pool and coastal environments.

Air to Life

What would you do if you were home alone with mum or dad and they collapsed? The key messages and elements in the Air to Life program equips grade 5 and 6 students with the skills and knowledge to know what to do in an emergency situation. The hands-on approach that Air to Life adopts ensures students not only watch but also participate in potential emergency situation scenario's. In 2005/06 students from across Victoria participated in the program, with Glenelg and the Macedon Ranges being very popular regional areas.

Surfing in the Suburbs

The controlled environment of the wave pool at Monash Aquatic and Recreation Centre allows for a perfect winter program. Wave Pool is an exciting and intense 1 hour program teaching students important skills such as wading, dolphining and body boarding while covering key water safety messages. This year over 1,100 students participated from schools, holiday programs, swimming and life saving clubs. The flexibility of Wave Pool similarly caters for a wide range of ages and groups. This year Salesian College participated in a 6 week extended Wave Pool program covering additional activities such as rescues, board paddling and survival.

Learning to Swim from 6 months

The Royal Life Saving Society Australia Infant Aquatics program is ideal for toddlers and infants from 6 months of age, providing them with the opportunity to develop socially, emotionally, cognitively and physically in a safe, structured and multi-sensory environment.

Infants and toddlers along with mum or dad participate in the program allowing them to creatively explore and practice skills safely, whilst developing self confidence and self esteem through activities in the following strands; getting wet, keeping

balance, breathing, basic kick and arm action, going underwater and staying afloat.

More than Swimming it's an Adventure

Over the last 20 years children from across the Nation have joined in the Royal Life Saving Society Australia Swim and Survive program, taking them on an adventure to reach the pinnacle, Level 7 – Senior Swim and Survive.

This year children from 5 to 14 years participated in the adventure which took them through not only swimming but essential water safety knowledge and life saving skills.

As the program grows in popularity, we have seen more schools' choosing the Swim and Survive program as it links to their curriculum. Allowing these schools to achieve the standards required in their Health and Physical Education Domain.

Junior Lifeguarding, it's Serious Fun!

As an exciting alternative to swimming lessons the Royal Life Saving Society Australia Junior Lifeguard Club is serious fun for 8 to 15 year olds.

Run in over 20 centres across the State, participants get to test their skills and knowledge in leadership, lifesaving, swimming, fitness and competition all whilst working together as a team.

This flexible program has a holistic approach to swimming and lifesaving whilst building important community links, which may incorporate camps, carnivals and programs.

Bronze

The Royal Life Saving Society Australia Bronze Rescue awards offer society the opportunity to gain potentially lifesaving skills no matter what their ability.

As the program encompasses 3 rescue awards followed by the Bronze Star, Bronze Medallion and Bronze Cross, students and the general public, who all have varying abilities, are able to participate and learn skills.

The awards within the Bronze Rescue structure give participants the knowledge and skills to be able to make the right survival decision, instinctive responses that may help them or those around them survive an aquatic emergency.

Participants in 2005-06 learned and practiced their skills through the Bronze

Rescue program in the hope that they would know what to do if faced with an emergency situation.

Beach Programs the New Trend

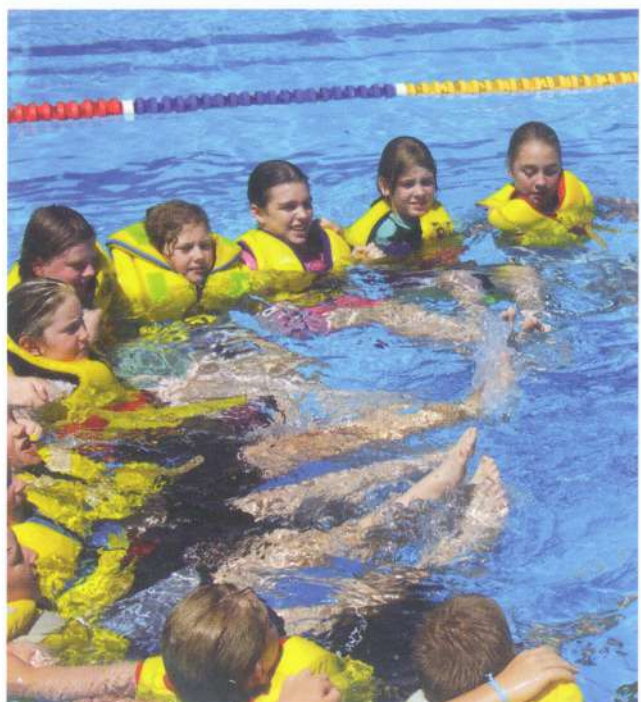
The tailor made Beach Programs have grown in popularity each year since their inception, reaching a total of 6,253 students over the 2005–06 summer period, an increase of almost 1,200 students since last year.

Beach Programs are delivered by qualified instructors who conduct a mix of theoretical and practical activities to engage the students in learning about beach safety and awareness along with different lifesaving skills.

Throughout the program students get to practice skills such as board paddling, tube rescues and beach flags making them feel like lifesavers even if only for a day.

Advance

Life Saving Victoria is a service provider for Advance, a Victorian government program for youth development. Life Saving Victoria has formed links with 43 schools from across the State, providing them with recognised training such as the SLSA Bronze Star, SLSA Bronze Medallion, RLSSA Bronze Rescue programs and First Aid courses, along with strong community links.

Lifesaving Youth and Leadership Development



Youth and Leadership Development

The Youth & Leadership Development (YL&D) Council are responsible for encouraging the participation of youth within Lifesaving. We implement a number of key programs that progress leadership development and assist with the retention of young lifesavers.

Programs on our Beaches *Nippers*

Fifty one Lifesaving Clubs across Victoria conducted 'Nippers' during the 2005/06 season. Nippers involve a series of Surf Education modules that teach our junior members (7–13 years) about beach safety and provide them with vital skills for water survival. The Nippers program provides a fun and friendly learning environment, as well as encouraging health and fitness. A total of approximately 5,450 Nippers were on Victorian beaches this year.

Each lifesaving club has a team of hard working, dedicated volunteers that give up countless hours to deliver the program. LSV provides continual support for clubs throughout the season to ensure the viability and success of the Nippers program.

Age Managers Course

Surf Life Saving Australia developed an Age Managers Course that provided additional training for clubs conducting junior programs. On completion of the course, accredited age managers have a greater knowledge of how lifesaving operates, the factors influencing growth and learning of young people and the components being delivered during the Nippers program. The Age Managers Course was conducted in

Victoria and resulted in 145 age managers becoming accredited. It is envisaged that all age managers involved in junior activities will become accredited for the 2006/07 Season.

Y&LD Planning Sessions

The Y&LD Planning Session provides lifesaving clubs with all the information and resources required for junior competition, junior/youth programs and leadership development for the upcoming season. Clubs are able to seek clarification on existing and new LSV programs.

Traditionally the planning session was held annually at Anglesea, however in 2005 they were extended to regional areas for greater accessibility to all clubs. In October, the Y&LD team travelled to Elwood (Central Victoria), Colac (Western Victoria) and Sale (Eastern Victoria) to deliver the one day session. All three sessions were very successful and the positive feedback provided will make sure a regional format continues for future years!

Leadership Development

The leadership development pathway consists of State and Nationally based programs designed for youth aged 13 to 25. The pathway provides our youth with the opportunity to develop the confidence and skills

necessary to undertake leadership roles within our organisation and the broader community.

State Leadership Development Programs *U/13 Development Camp*

This camp was conducted at the Anglesea Recreation Camp in February. 112 participants attend from 23 clubs across the State. The program focuses on the transition between the 'Nippers' and the patrolling lifesaver. Participants were involved in a variety of activities such as team building, leadership and initiative activities as well as an introduction to patrolling activities. Member Protection**

Life Saving Victoria welcomes the Working with Children Act that requires volunteers working with children to undergo a 'Working with Children Check' by 1 July 2008. The Y&LD Council will be encouraging all age managers to complete the check during the 2006/07 Season. The Working with Children Check will be part of our overall member protection guidelines.

Surf Education

The Surf Ed program is scheduled to change for the 2006/07 season. The program has been modified so the competencies gained by participants will count towards the Surf Rescue Certificate. This will provide young lifesavers that have completed Nippers, recognition for the skills and theory already learnt.

Development Program**

With such a defined leadership pathway for the 12–16 years within Victoria, our next project will be developing a scholarship program for the 18–25 age group. We are currently looking into sponsorship for this program to be able to provide participants with a 12 month program, ongoing

support and mentoring opportunities. The program intends to give participants the chance to become involved in lifesaving at a State and National level.

Aquatic Risk Management



Aquatic Risk Management

Life Saving Victoria's Aquatic Risk Management department can conduct assessments on any aquatic environment, whether natural or man made, giving a detailed and comprehensive assessment of potential risks, how these can be addressed and what potential improvements can be made.

There were several key highlights in the ARM Department this year. The department launched a fully revised Supervision section for Royal Life Saving's Guidelines for Safe Pool Operation (GSPO). Three sets of new guidelines were developed for Royal Life Saving covering water safety for Body Corporates, Hotel/Motels/Caravan & Camping Grounds. A water safety document / operations manual was developed for VicUrban which included designs for extraction ladders and life rings.

2005-06 saw the launch of the Platinum Pool Award which is a safety award designed to reward swimming pools based on our Swimming Pool Safety Assessment and mystery guest visits. The Platinum Pool Award was very well received by the aquatics industry with 11 pools participating in its first year. The Platinum Pool Award also led to the launch of mystery guest and formal lifeguard supervision assessments as separate products.

The Swimming Pool Safety Assessment (SPSA) continues to grow strongly with 76 (1 in NSW) being conducted. This represents a 40% growth in this area from last year and a 550% growth over the last 4 years. The Platinum Pool Award

in its first year had 11 pools participate, including the Dandenong Oasis. Inland Waterway risk assessments were completed for two Local Government Authorities as well as a number of them for Delfin in Caroline Springs.

Future Developments

A very exciting project for the future is the partnership with Delfin which will see ARM perform risk assessments on all of Delfin's sites in Victoria in the next few months, including desk top audits for assets that are still on the drawing board.

The Platinum Pool Award is expected to grow to at least 20 swimming pools which will give them due recognition for their very high safety standards. It is planned that the number of SPSA's delivered next year will continue to show the growth of the previous years.

Coastal Aquatic Risk Management & GIS

The standardisation of aquatic risk and safety signage at coastal locations across Victoria has continued this year. Life Saving Victoria has conducted coastal aquatic risk and safety signage assessments for a variety of clients both within Victoria and Interstate. Victorian clients have included Local Government Authorities and Foreshore Committees of Management

such as East Gippsland Shire Council, Bass Coast Shire Council and The Walkerville Foreshore Committee of Management. This year risk assessments have been completed for sixteen beaches (approximately 12kms of coastline) within Victoria.

However, the majority of coastal aquatic risk assessments completed this year have been on behalf of interstate Surf Life Saving Associations. Life Saving Victoria has completed risk assessments on behalf of Surf Life Saving Western Australia (31 beaches assessed, approximately 34kms of coastline) and Surf Life Saving Queensland (10 beaches assessed, approximately 5kms of coastline). It is envisaged that demand from interstate organisations for Life Saving Victoria's coastal aquatic risk management and consultancy services will continue to grow and that through such projects the number of coastal locations with standardised aquatic risk and safety signage will increase.

Life Saving Victoria continues to play an active role in the development of both Australian and International Standards for water safety signage. The Aquatic and Recreational Signage Style Guide, which is the best practice document for water

safety signage, is in the process of being updated into its third edition and adopted as a national best practice document.

Additionally, Life Saving Victoria continues to contribute to the advancement of the Australian Beach Safety and Management Program (ABSAMP), which is a comprehensive database of the beaches of the Australian coast, and to the process of conducting and standardising coastal aquatic risk assessments across Australia.

The use of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) for data capture and reporting within the department has been further enhanced and developed this year with Life Saving Victoria being successful in receiving regular expert training and advice from The Office of the Emergency Services Commissioner. Life Saving Victoria was also accepted as a participant member of the Victorian Emergency Services Organisations GIS User Group and worked with The Victorian Partnership for Advanced Computing and The Office of the Emergency Services Commissioner to develop a 'proof of concept' web mapping application called HazMap.



Life Saving Victoria's HazMap application project was designed using open source software and aimed to demonstrate how web-based GIS technology could provide a mechanism for the entry and display of near-real time information and potentially enhance the services offered by Life Saving Victoria.

Dandenong Oasis



Dandenong Oasis

15 years of Success at the Dandenong Oasis

The Dandenong Oasis was officially opened to the public on January 26, 1991. This new centre incorporated the W.G. Wright Recreation Centre which was refurbished by the City of Greater Dandenong in 1989-1990. The facility contained a 50 metre pool, 25 metre leisure pool with water slide, toddler pool, hydrotherapy pool, spa, sauna, six squash courts, exhibition hall, two function rooms and crèche area.

Life Saving Victoria (LSV) and previously the Royal Life Saving Society Australia Victoria Branch (RLSSAV) have been the successful managers of the Dandenong Oasis for the past 15 years. On June 30 their management term came to an end. Life Saving Victoria's Board made the tough decision not to re-tender for the management of the Centre. After assessing Life Saving Victoria's strategic direction for the next five to ten years and the changing landscape of facility management, Life Saving Victoria deemed it the best case scenario to exit the facility while still at the forefront of the Aquatic Industry.

Aquatic Education

From humble beginnings of no enrolments, the Learn to Swim program became one of the largest programs in Victoria.

At its peak it facilitated 2,600 children per week. Today it still conducts lessons for over 2,000 students. This is testament to the expertise and professionalism of the education staff as increased competition has seen at least eight new learn to swim facilities open within a 10 kilometre radius of the Centre over the past 10 years.

The School Swimming program was also a huge success, with several schools continuing to utilise the facility even though newer facilities opened closer to their respective schools. The Oasis can boast having schools travel over 70 kilometres to participate in the program.

In addition to this the Oasis Education Team developed a Water Safety Education program in response to an identified gap in this area for secondary school aged children. This saw a large increase in secondary school participation.

The Oasis was also used to pilot both the Aquapass Swim program and more recently Swim and Survive.

Health and Fitness

The Oasis has been ground breaking in many health and fitness initiatives. In 1997-1998 the Oasis was one of the first aquatic centres to conduct programs for the Muslim and Culturally

And Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities, some of which are still running successfully today. Several awards have been received over the past 15 years in acknowledgement of the Oasis's success in conducting these programs.

The Oasis has also recently been recognised nationally in the Network Fitness Centres of the Year awards, receiving a top 10 finish in 2005 and a top four position in 2006

Recreation

Creative recreation has always been a major focus of the Oasis, and has continued to seek alternative ways for children to have fun while learning to be safe in and around the water. Holiday programs were implemented in 1991 and partners such as the Dandenong Rangers basketball team, Speedo, Coca Cola, Sanitarium and Streets Ice-Cream were utilised to create a draw card for the younger members of the community.

Family Fun Days were conducted four times a year, with a two-fold focus. To increase awareness of the centre, its programs and facilities and to secondly, raise awareness and money for local charities. These events gave the Oasis staff and guests a sense of community and added to the warm, friendly atmosphere at the centre.

Quality Guest Service

Quality Guest Service (QGS) forms a large part of the philosophy of the Oasis. It is a sincere commitment to treating visitors to the Oasis as if they were personal guests invited into the centre.

With increased competition, QGS has provided a vital competitive edge over the years. Guests and members were given exceptional service whenever they visited the Dandenong Oasis. This included attempting to understand their needs and expectations and ensuring that every visit was an enjoyable experience.

Operations

The Oasis always strived for operational excellence however this was sometimes difficult to achieve with an ageing facility and lack of sufficient funds being made available. To counter this, a comprehensive routine maintenance program was put into place, complemented by an extensive programmed maintenance program. These two initiatives saved the Oasis thousands of dollars and ensured the facilities remained in the best possible physical condition. Many cost/energy/water saving initiatives were also implemented at the Oasis, reinforcing RLSSAV's and LSV's commitment to operating a triple bottom line facility.

Partners

The Oasis believed that developing strategic partnerships was and is the way to achieve continued business growth. In 1998 a partnership was developed with Cedar Court HealthSouth Rehabilitation Hospital. Cedar Court were looking to expand their operation to include a satellite centre in the outer suburbs of Melbourne and the Oasis identified a need to expand its health facilities and capitalise on under utilised space. An old activities room was converted into consulting rooms and offices, and Cedar Court moved in. The initiative was very successful and Cedar Court soon out grew these rooms. For the partnership to continue a solution had to be found and in 2002 portable offices/consulting rooms were erected in the grounds of the Oasis. The success continued and in late 2005 Cedar Court required more space, this time an under utilised squash court was converted into a consulting suite.

The Oasis has worked diligently over the past 15 years to develop several partnerships. Other successful partnerships include, South East Primary Care Partnership, Migrant Resource Centre, Smith Family, Swimming Victoria, physiotherapists, chiropractors, naturopaths,

podiatrists, massage therapists, health food providers, footwear companies, real estate agents, local schools, sports stadiums and local sporting clubs. Developing good relationships has allowed the Oasis' business to grow by utilising the expertise and cross promotion opportunities provided by all parties involved.

Highlights

There have been many highlights over the past 15 years. One of which includes witnessing the development of many long term staff, members and guests and knowing that the Oasis has received over 10 million guests of which most enjoyed a safe and positive experience.

Other highlights include the many awards achieved over this time:

- > Three RLSSAV commendations received for successful rescue and resuscitation of guests, 1996, 1997, 2001
- > Recipient of Facility Management award for improvements in facility management by Australian Leisure Institute (Best Water Quality in metropolitan Melbourne) 1997.
- > Recipient of 'Program Initiative Award' in recognition of innovation in programming by Australian Leisure Institute

(Introduction of fitness classes for Spanish speaking men and women) 1998.

- > Recipient of Active Australia's Innovation award for the Introduction of fitness classes for Spanish speaking men and women 1998.
- > Recipient of Heart Foundations Healthy Heart Award for outstanding physical activity project.
- > Oasis lifeguards won the inaugural national lifeguarding championships 1998.
- > Oasis lifeguard received the Victorian Aquatic Industry Councils Lifeguard of the year award 2002.
- > Winner of Local Business of the Year award on three occasions in the Health & Fitness / Sports Centre category 2005, 2003, 2002.
- > Finalist in Local Business of the Year award on three occasions in the Health & Fitness / Sports Centre category.
- > Winner of Local Business of the year Award for overall business, in 2005.
- > First recipient of Life Saving Victoria's Platinum Pool Award with highest recorded safety score of 98.1% 2005.
- > Commenced a fitness class for 'Breast Cancer' sufferers group.

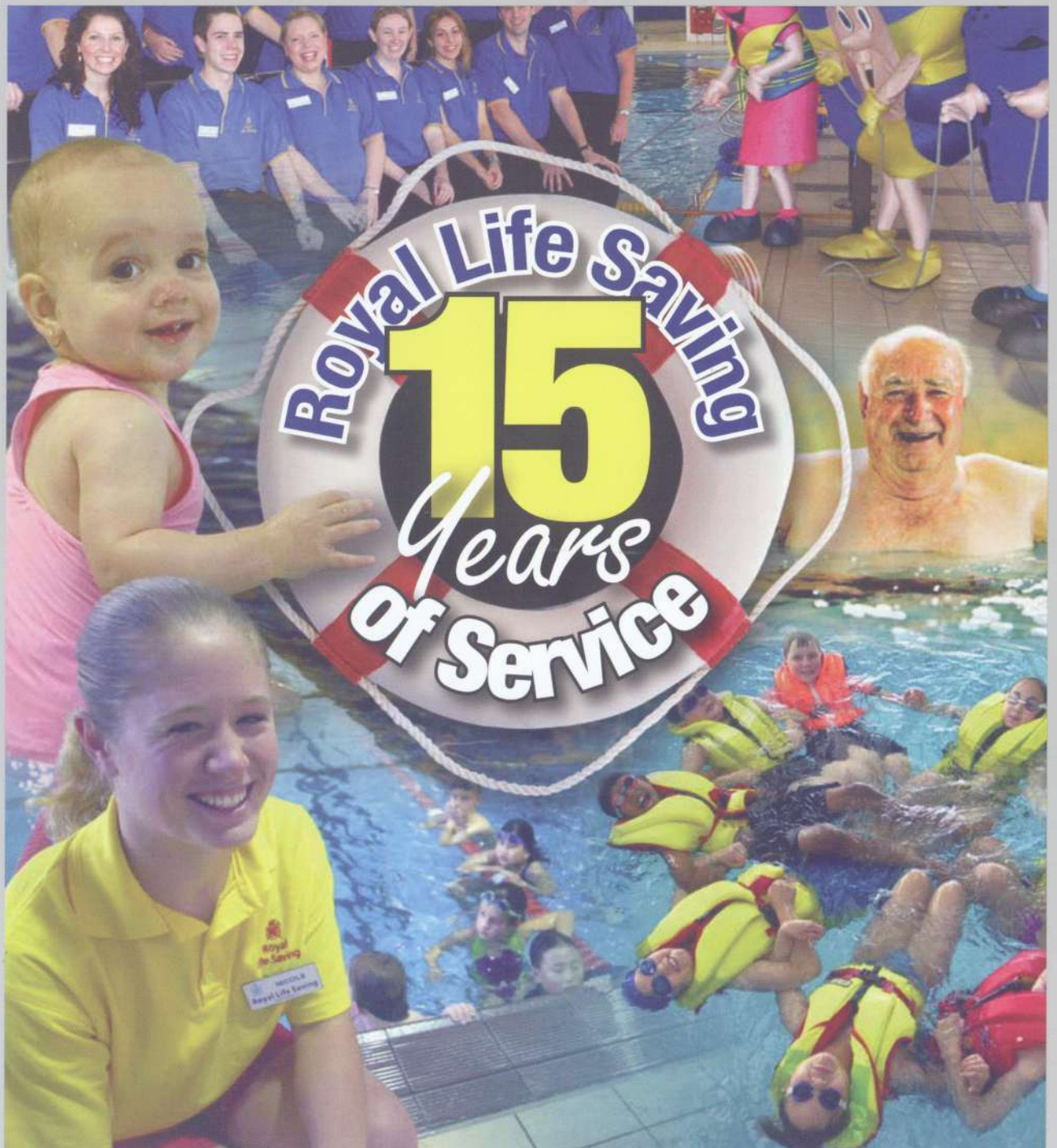
Summary

15 Years of Service



Research

Life Saving Victoria's Research department is integral to the mission of the organisation to prevent aquatic related death and injury in all Victorian Communities.



Research

Research in 2005/2006 focused on the continued assessment of the frequency and patterns of accidental drowning and near drowning in Victoria, injury surveillance in public swimming pools, boating, personal floatation devices, water safety for culturally and linguistically diverse communities, volunteer membership retention and campaign and program evaluation.

Partnerships

The development of the research capacity of Life Saving Victoria is supported by the partnership with the Department of Justice, Office of the Emergency Services Commissioner. Partnerships and collaboration with other agencies such as Aquatics & Recreation Victoria, Surfing Victoria, NSW Department of Sport and Recreation, Australian National Sport Fishing Association, Parks Victoria as well as the State Coroners Office Victoria and the National Coroners Information System has also been invaluable.

Research

The various research projects undertaken by Life Saving Victoria in 2005/2006 are detailed below. In addition to these projects the key ongoing function of the Research area is in the assessment of the frequency and patterns of accidental drowning Victoria. This information is collected from

the State Coroners Office Victoria and the National Coroners Information System.

The Life Saving Victoria Research area also responds to various data and literature requests on aquatic related death and injury from Industry, Government, the media and the community.

Projects

Pool Injury Surveillance Research Project

Investigators: Alistair Thom, Dr Bernadette Matthews, Warwick Waters and Richard Franklin.

Studies have looked at drowning fatalities in public and residential swimming pools and the potential factors involved. However, very little evidence exists to detail the extent of other injuries that occur in commercial aquatic facilities.

This study aimed to describe the type of injuries that occur at public swimming pools, the locations within the pools where injuries occur, the type of medical treatment required and the rate of injury. Major and Minor incident report forms were collected from 18 commercial aquatic facilities across metropolitan and regional Victoria. The results provided an indication of the typical types of injuries that occur in public swimming pools.

This study was supported by a grant from The Royal Life Saving Society Australia.

Volunteer Member Retention Analysis

Investigator: Dr Bernadette Matthews.

A crucial part of Life Saving Victoria is the large volunteer membership base, supporting the organisation by providing their time, service and skills for no financial payment. In order to retain our volunteer members there is a need to determine the reasons why they remain within the organisation and why they decide to leave.

Over 200 currently active and previously active volunteer lifesaving club members were surveyed. General motivational factors along with factors specific to lifesaving that motivate people to volunteer for Life Saving Victoria were identified along with the personal and organisational constraints to participation. Various needs for recruitment and retention of volunteer members for lifesaving were identified.

This study was supported by a grant from the Victorian Valuing Volunteer Emergency Service Workers Program.

Personal Floatation Device (PFD) Study

Investigators: Dr Bernadette Matthews, Brett Ellis.

New marine safety regulations regarding the compulsory wearing of personal floatation devices (PFDs) for recreational boaters were introduced in December 2005. This presents implications for lifesavers and lifeguards operating inflatable rescue boats in the future in Victoria. Life Saving Victoria therefore conducted a review of different types of PFDs for use in lifesaving activities.

Following on from a pilot study conducted in 2004/2005 a study of three models of PFDs (Type 1, 2 and 3) for use by lifeguards and lifesavers while operating an inflatable rescue boat was conducted. The study consisted of two parts, i) A trial of PFDs in surf conditions and rescue scenarios, and ii) A survey of members to assess the suitability and acceptance of the PFDs. Results from this report will be disseminated in 2006/2007.

Evaluation

Evaluation of Life Saving Victoria's programs and campaigns are integral to maintain high quality and up-to-date promotion of water safety to the community. New education



programs were evaluated in 2005/2006 along with existing Life Saving Victoria education programs which are continually evaluated.

Projects

Evaluation of water safety education for CALD communities

Investigators: Dr Bernadette Matthews and Brooke Irvine.

Language and cultural barriers may reduce the accessibility of culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities to water safety education and training. This may place members of these groups and those in their care at a greater risk of drowning. Therefore, targeted water safety education programs are necessary to reach these community groups. This project aims to determine the effectiveness of a water safety education program targeted to children and parents from the Vietnamese community.

The study, supported by a grant from The Royal Life Saving Society Australia is due for completion in 2006/2007.

Evaluation of the Boating Safety for Kids program

Investigators: Dr Bernadette Matthews, Warwick Waters, Brooke Irvine and Andrew Skillern.

Evaluation of the Boating Safety for Kids program began in early 2005. The program, aims to facilitate student learning for future recreational boating use, targeting Upper Primary School students, Years 4–6.

The number of students undertaking the program was determined for both metropolitan and regional Victoria. A questionnaire was administered to school teachers to obtain their feedback on the quality and delivery of the program. A questionnaire has also been developed to determine the level of knowledge of boating safety in children.

Support for the Boating Safety for Kids program is provided by a Marine Safety Victoria grant.

Evaluation of 2005–2006 Play It Safe by the Water campaign

The 'Play It Safe by the Water' campaign, a Victorian Government partnership with Life Saving Victoria, Aquatic and Recreation Victoria and Surfing Victoria, is continually monitored to ensure the effectiveness and uptake of key water safety messages throughout the community. Sweeney Research conducted telephone surveys in 2005/2006 interviewing 500 Victorians to determine attitudes to water safety, and awareness of and attitudes to water safety advertising.

Swim Safe Roos Evaluation

In 2005 the Office of the Emergency Services Commissioner facilitated a community partnership program between Life Saving Victoria, the North Melbourne Football Club/Kangaroos and Play It Safe by the Water. The resultant 'Swim Safe Roos' Campaign was designed to address the number of drowning fatalities that occur, during the non-summer months as well as targeting young adult males who represent over 90% of drowning deaths in the 15–24 year age group.

A study was conducted prior to the launch of a new television commercial in November 2005. The study consisted of focus group discussion sessions to assess the response to the television commercial including the impact of key messages on young adults in the target group. The television commercial provided a strong impact on participants and in particular, provided the desired messages to the young adult male audience being targeted.

Future Projects

The results from the various research and evaluation projects will be used to modify ongoing programs and direct future research.

In response to the emerging trend of rock fishing fatalities in Victorian waters a pilot project has been proposed. This project will include a targeted public awareness campaign, a trial of Angel Ring Life Buoys as per the NSW model and a trial of a rock fishing seminar/workshop.

Life Saving Victoria is also working on projects directed towards education and public awareness of the continuing trend of toddler drowning deaths in dams.

Communications

Promoting and protecting the brand and image of Life Saving Victoria.





The 2005-2006 year was one full of major events and emerging opportunities for Lifesaving in Victoria in all media, promotions and sponsorship areas of the business. With further development of links with the Play It Safe by the Water campaign, the World Life Saving Games and a number of major media events, the communications department was kept very busy.

The communications department of Life Saving Victoria was further refined and developed throughout the year. Increased responsibility within the Play It Safe by the Water campaign, new initiatives with the Kangaroos Football Club, stronger public relations links with our National bodies and a busy summer of media attention led to a year of comprehensive communication and coverage for Life Saving Victoria.

Web communications was further developed with a number of successful email newsletters being released throughout the year, further enhancing Life Saving Victoria's communication capabilities with its members and affiliates. The email newsletter has been highly successful in communicating to everyone the enormous diversity of Life Saving Victoria and allows everyone to stay up to date with all its news and events, both State wide and Nationally.

The communications department of Life Saving Victoria chairs the Play It Safe by the Water communications committee and facilitates the campaign. There were multiple elements to the campaign over the year including the launch of the 'Swim Safe Roos' message targeted young males 16-24 years, who see themselves as invincible and believe they can behave in a risky manner around water.

The 43 strong squad at the Kangaroos is approximately the same number of people who drown each year in Victoria. Football is a winter sport, and the 'Swim Safe Roos' message will raise awareness of water safety during the cooler months, as 50% of drowning occur during Autumn, Winter and Spring.

The Play It Safe Regional Media Roadshow was the other big campaign for the year. Life Saving Victoria staff along with representatives from other water safety agencies travelled throughout Victoria, spreading the water safety message far and wide.

The ability to inform and respond to lifesaving issues were the main fundamentals of the media coverage for the year. A number of issues emerged during the summer including Shark attacks, coronial investigations, mass rescues and drownings. In terms of Life Saving Victoria

media support programs from across all areas of the business were supported during the 2005-2006 summer period. Education programs received an incredible amount of exposure with their Telstra Beach to Bush, Open Water Learning Experience, Beach visits, Telegames and the Boating Safety for Kids program.

Communications also lent their support to such diverse projects as The Platinum Pool Award, Ethnic Beach Safety, Rock Fishing drowning prevention campaign and Ky Hurst's bid for dancing fame on Channel 7's Dancing with the Stars.

Lifesaving Sport was also well covered with extensive coverage of the junior and senior events, State Junior and Senior Championships and The World Titles, Rescue 2006. A number of media opportunities were also involving lifesavers who volunteered their time to promote both Life Saving Victoria and their own clubs.

Support needs to be recognised from all media outlets, and particularly, the Geelong Advertiser and Echo newspapers, Colac Herald, Warrnambool Standard, Sunraysia Daily, Shepparton News, Herald Sun, The Age and Leader newspapers. All three major television networks have supported lifesaving throughout the

year as well as the ABC and regional networks WIN and Prime for great education and sports stories as part of their news packages.

Continued support has also been received from radio stations 774 ABC and ABC regional radio stations, 3AW, Ace Radio networks across the State and our local partnership with Jim Graham at 3WBC in Melbourne's inner East .

We have been supported by the terrific support from our sponsors over the past year in developing firm partnerships to build long lasting involvement. Westpac's support of the Lifesaver aircraft has been terrific with some great exposure on radio and in Melbourne press. Our national sponsors have also been well serviced, namely Telstra with Beach to Bush, Club support fund and junior support. DHL's support on our lifesaving uniforms across the State and during the World titles was also invaluable.

Support from members, staff and the general public again proved essential when promoting and supporting such a diverse and unique organisation. Without this support, Life Saving Victoria would not receive the support, recognition and exposure required to continue as Victoria's peak aquatic safety body.

This season has been one of the busiest seasons to date both in the pool and at the beach. Along with the normal calendar of events, this season saw a Pool Lifesaving Interstate Challenge, the Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships and Rescue 2006 come to Victoria.

Season 2005/2006 saw a healthy increase in participants competing at the 2006 Victorian Lifesaving Championships in Portland and the 2006 Masters Lifesaving Championships held in Lorne. Our pool competition and IRB competition are steadily growing and being embraced by more clubs and participants. The strength of Aquatic Sport continues to grow now that Aquatic Sport truly is an all year round sport for everyone.

The Aquatic Sports Executive is responsible for the facilitation of Aquatic Sports and related activities to foster an increased participation in the sport of lifesaving in Victoria. The Executive aims to continuously review all aspects of aquatic sports competition including Beach, Pool and IRB Competitions for youth, senior, and master's athletes.

Local Competition

Beach Competitions

A successful 2005/06 beach carnival season was conducted this year with a hand over of the reins to Peter van Deuren taking on the role of Chief Referee and making a few changes to the officiating structures and competition arena. A new program of events was trialed with positive results.

Pool Lifesaving Competitions

Pool Lifesaving competition in Victoria is growing and we are looking to increase participation for the 2007 season. Pool Lifesaving is predominantly metropolitan based and carnivals are held at Sandringham and Dandenong Oasis. It is the aim of the executive for carnivals to expand to further regions in the near future.

Schools and pool lifeguards from the local community are now included in the Pool Lifesaving winter season, which will help to grow the sport of Pool Lifesaving and teach young people water safety skills while maintaining fitness during the winter season.

State Teams

One Victoria Team – Beach State Team

The 2006 Victorian Surf Lifesaving State team attended the Interstate Championships at

Queenscliff NSW on the 23rd and 24th January 2006.

This years Interstate Challenge at Queenscliff SLSC saw the Junior and Senior Teams compete together for the first time. It was an outstanding success from a team point of view, without doubt the junior and senior members of the team grew closer over the trip. Undoubtedly the support and team spirit displayed, was a big factor in some outstanding individual and team efforts.

Victoria (including junior and senior cumulative results) overall was placed 4th.

Pool State Team

The 2006 Victorian Pool Lifesaving State team attended the Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships at Kardinia Aquatic Centre, Geelong on 11th January to 14th January 2006.

Two Victorian competitors, Ben Hannaker and Felicity Harrison were both selected in the Australian Pool Lifesaving U16 (Aussie Barra's) Team to compete at the Grand Prix events and Arafura games May 2007. Not only is this a wonderful personal achievement for each of these athletes, but signals the first time that two Victorians have been selected in the same Australian Team. It also signals the third successive

year that Victorian Team members have been selected as Australian Representatives in Pool Lifesaving.

Four other members of the Victoria team were selected for the Australian Talent ID squad- Lisa Ferguson, Brian Lim, Kim Stewart and Luke Harper.

Victoria placed 4th overall, having improved upon the 2005 result by 25%, finished in fourth place to South Australia by a margin of only 20 points.

The team results, whilst a credit to the individual athlete, were enhanced due to the capable, committed and innovative coaching provided by James Evans.

Stewart Irving assisted James and we thank them for giving their time to the team, as well as Team Managers Mitch Hannaker and Michelle Byatt.

High Performance

The Victorian High Performance program provided funding to twelve U/21 athletes. The twelve athletes received financial assistance to support their attendance at national competition.

The High Performance program is designed to nurture and support elite athletes.

Aquatic Sport

State Championships Senior State Beach Championships

The 2006 Victorian Senior Lifesaving Championships was held at Bridgewater Bay on the 11th & 12th March 2006 hosted by the Portland SLSC.

The Championships were a great success and Aquatic Sports Executive and sports staff would like to thank Portland SLSC for their club effort in pulling the event together. The entire club was out there in force to help in some way, shape or form over the three-day weekend.

The winning club of the overall point score for the State Championships was Ocean Grove SLSC.

Masters State Beach Championships

The 2006 Victorian Masters Lifesaving Championships was held at Lorne on the 4th February 2006 hosted by the Lorne SLSC. The carnival was a huge success with the highest number of participants recorded to date. Masters competition is most definitely on the rise.

Pool Lifesaving State Championships U8-U14 State Championships

The U8 & 10 Championships and the U10 & U12 Championships was held at Sandringham Pool in August 2005 with participants

from both Bay and Ocean clubs attending. Great fun was had by all those who attended, with the emphasis on learning pool lifesaving competition in a relaxed and supportive environment. The parents and friends who come along to watch make for a great atmosphere for the Championships with highlight of the carnival being the parent/child relay race.

Pool Lifesaving Senior State Championships

Held at Dandenong Oasis on the 24th August 2005 with participants from both Bay clubs and Ocean clubs. The 2005 State Champs saw a significant increase in the number of competitors and clubs attending from previous years and we will continue to support their growth and development in Pool Lifesaving.

IRB State Championships

2005 Victorian IRB Championships were held at Bancoora last August, seven clubs contested them. At Rescue 2006 held in February eight Victorian clubs were competing. This current season we have seven clubs competing and an expanding base of Officials that are so integral to conducting safe and fair IRB carnivals.

Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships

Victoria was the host State for the 2006 RLSSA's Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships. Life Saving Victoria set up an organising committee comprising of staff and volunteers who worked tirelessly to ensure the 2006 APLC was the best ever yet run. The Championship served as a test event for the World Lifesaving Titles – Rescue 2006 that was to be held at the newly built Geelong Aquatic Centre, International standard outdoor 50m pool. Thanks must go to this committee for doing a fantastic job in staging this event.

Australian Surf Lifesaving Championships

The 2006 Australian Surf Lifesaving Championships was held at Kurrawa beach on the Gold Coast from the 29th March to the 2nd April 2006 for the final year after 12 years on the Gold Coast. Victoria gained some fantastic results this year with a definite increase in the U15 to U19 age groups of competitors making finals.

Telstra School Surf League

The School Surf League is an exciting summer event in the Surf Life Saving Surf Sports calendar. The competition aims to provide secondary school students with an alternative leisure experience

that tests endurance, strength, speed and agility in the most natural sporting arena – the beach.

The 2006 Telstra School Surf League was held across four regions of the State between February and March 2006. Regions included: Peninsula, Metropolitan, Surf Coast, West Coast and culminating in a State final at Torquay.

The State champion's male division was taken out by St. Bedes B followed by Melbourne Grammar and Mentone Grammar. The female division was won by Methodist Ladies College followed by Sacred Heart College Geelong and Mentone Grammar.

The Telstra School Surf League is open to all secondary schools across the State and competitors competed in a number of modified events including run swim run, beach sprint, beach relay, beach flags, board relay, board rescue, wade relay and Aqua Cameron. A big thank you to Bernie Murray for donating his time to officiate at the Telstra School Surf League.

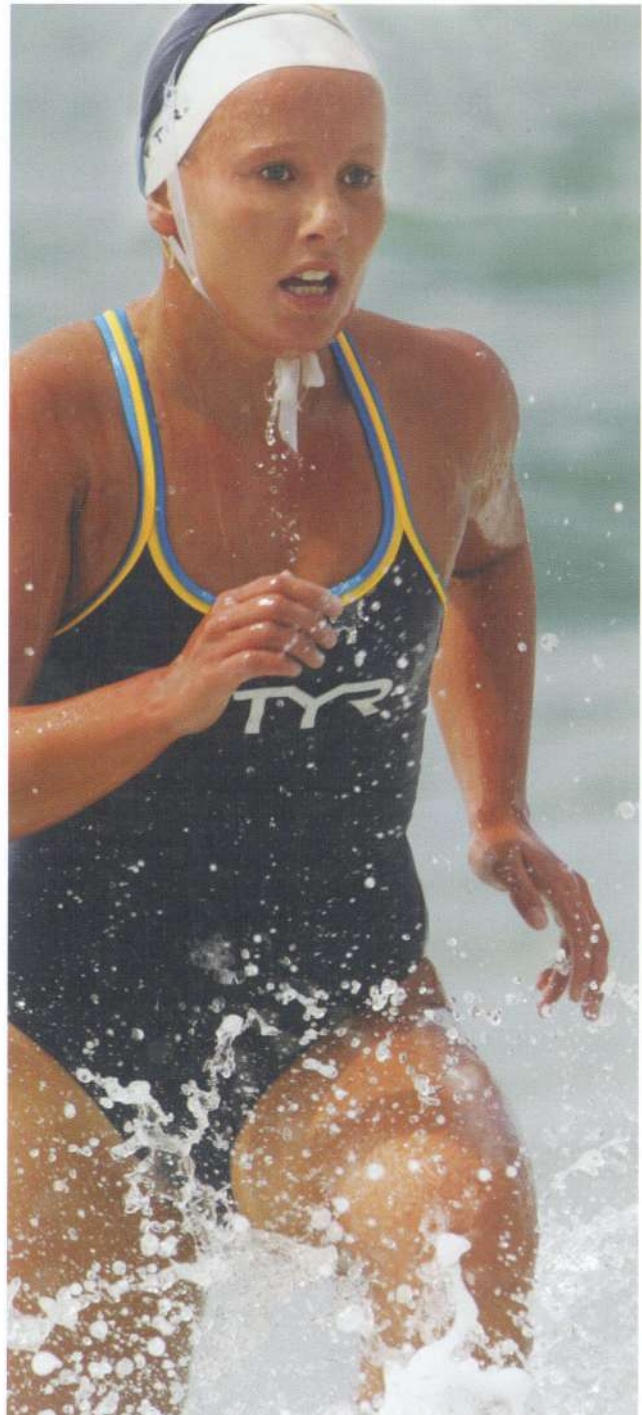

Surfboat racing returned to Victorian beaches last summer with the launch of the Red Rooster State Surfboat Premierships.

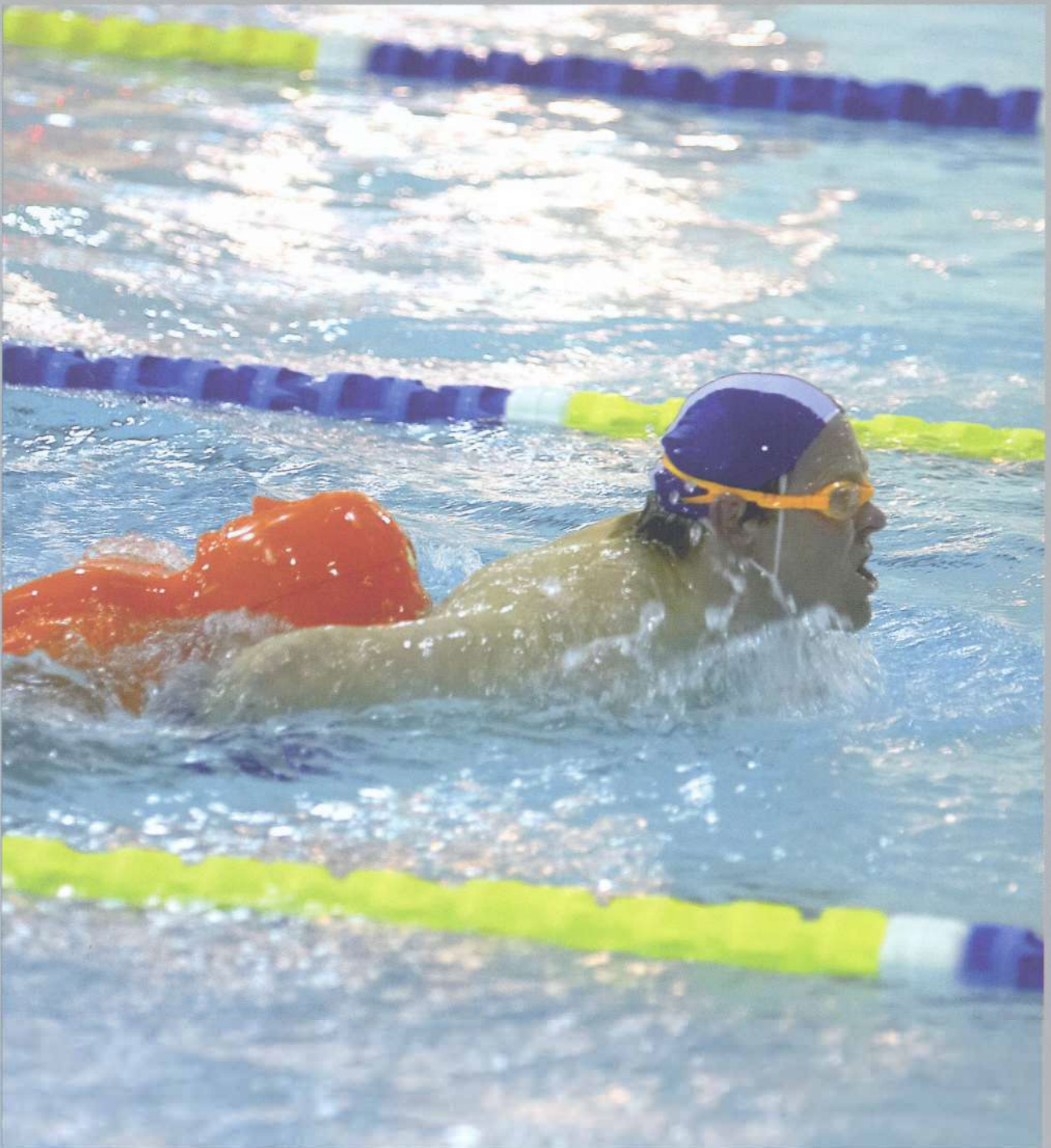

Rescue 2006 – the International Life Saving Federation (ILS) World Lifesaving Championships – was a celebration of lifesaving and the 'best-ever' world lifesaving championships.



Rescue 06

The Championships supported the ILS mission – the safety and preservation of human life in the aquatic environment – and assisted developing nations.

Detailed planning, strong working relationships with the key partners and significant communications, PR and promotional activity ensured the Championships received unprecedented media coverage and commercial support and were simply breathtaking.

With 3,500 competitors from over 30 countries, Rescue 2006 was one of the largest sporting events ever held in Geelong and Lorne and a huge tourism boost for Geelong, the Surf Coast and local regions.

Key Highlights

Developing Nations

The Developing Nations program exemplified the competitor enjoyment at Rescue 2006.

Approximately 100 international visitors were hosted for up to three weeks at local lifesaving clubs, where they received coaching and training in all aspects of lifesaving.

The program, at a cost of \$AUD 250,000, proved to be a highlight of Rescue 2006 and was gratefully received by the nations – Argentina, Czech Republic, Egypt, India, Indonesia, Malaysia,

Poland, Romania, St. Lucia – and resulted in overjoyed competitors sharing in the camaraderie of lifesaving.

The tangible reward for the coaching program was a gold medal for St. Lucia (ILS World Masters Championships Mens Beach Sprint) and a bronze for Indonesia (ILS National Teams Championships Womens Beach Relay).

Among the intangibles were the friendships developed between the nations and the local SLSCs – Anglesea, Fairhaven, Jan Juc, Ocean Grove, Point Lonsdale and Wye River – as well as the skills, techniques and other lessons to help make the water a safer place.

Participation Numbers

A record 3,497 competitors – 2,481 males and 1,016 females attended Rescue 2006.

Legacy

Rescue 2006 made a significant contribution to the Victorian economy. Independent research conducted in 2001 concluded a total economic impact of \$28.7 million (using 2001 dollars) would result, comprising direct expenditure of \$9.7 million and indirect expenditure of \$19.0 million.

Accommodation booked through the Event Travel Office totalled 1,348 persons from 20 countries.

Less tangible benefits for the region included an extension of the peak tourism season; an increased awareness of Geelong, Lorne and Victoria as a travel destination; increased local pride and community spirit; increased local interest and participation in lifesaving and aquatic safety and infrastructure and service improvements.

In particular the Championships were the catalyst for an upgrade to Geelong's Kardinia Aquatic Centre to increase the usability of the facility.

The City of Greater Geelong spent \$4.4m to construct a 50-metre, 10-lane, FINA-compliant pool for Rescue 2006 and thanks are extended to Council.

Similarly, the redevelopment of the Lorne foreshore occurred largely as a result of Rescue 2006. Projects completed included the construction of a boardwalk adjacent to the beach, the redevelopment of the beach-side kiosk and the installation of paths, stone walls and fences.

The Great Ocean Road Coast Committee (formerly the Lorne Foreshore Committee of Management) is to be commended for these initiatives.

Media Coverage

The media coverage of Rescue 2006 was very successful.

Scrapbooks maintained by GSDM, the contracted media managers, show a constant stream of coverage – local, national and international – prior to the Championships and extensive coverage during and post-Championships.

Coverage was provided by approximately 120 accredited press, radio and television personnel, including 12 internationals (five press, six photographers and one television representative).

The Geelong Advertiser provided unprecedented coverage of a Rescue series, while photographs and articles were also published in metropolitan dailies The Age and the Herald-Sun during the Championships.

K-Rock 95.5FM, the Official Radio Station, provided outside broadcasts and comprehensive news and sport coverage during Rescue 2006.

Other radio stations to cover the Championships included the ABC network and SEN1116.

Television coverage was achieved through a one hour highlights package on Channel Nine on Saturday 4 March, a travel/tourism segment on Channel Seven in early April and sports news (Queensland/NSW) during the Championships.

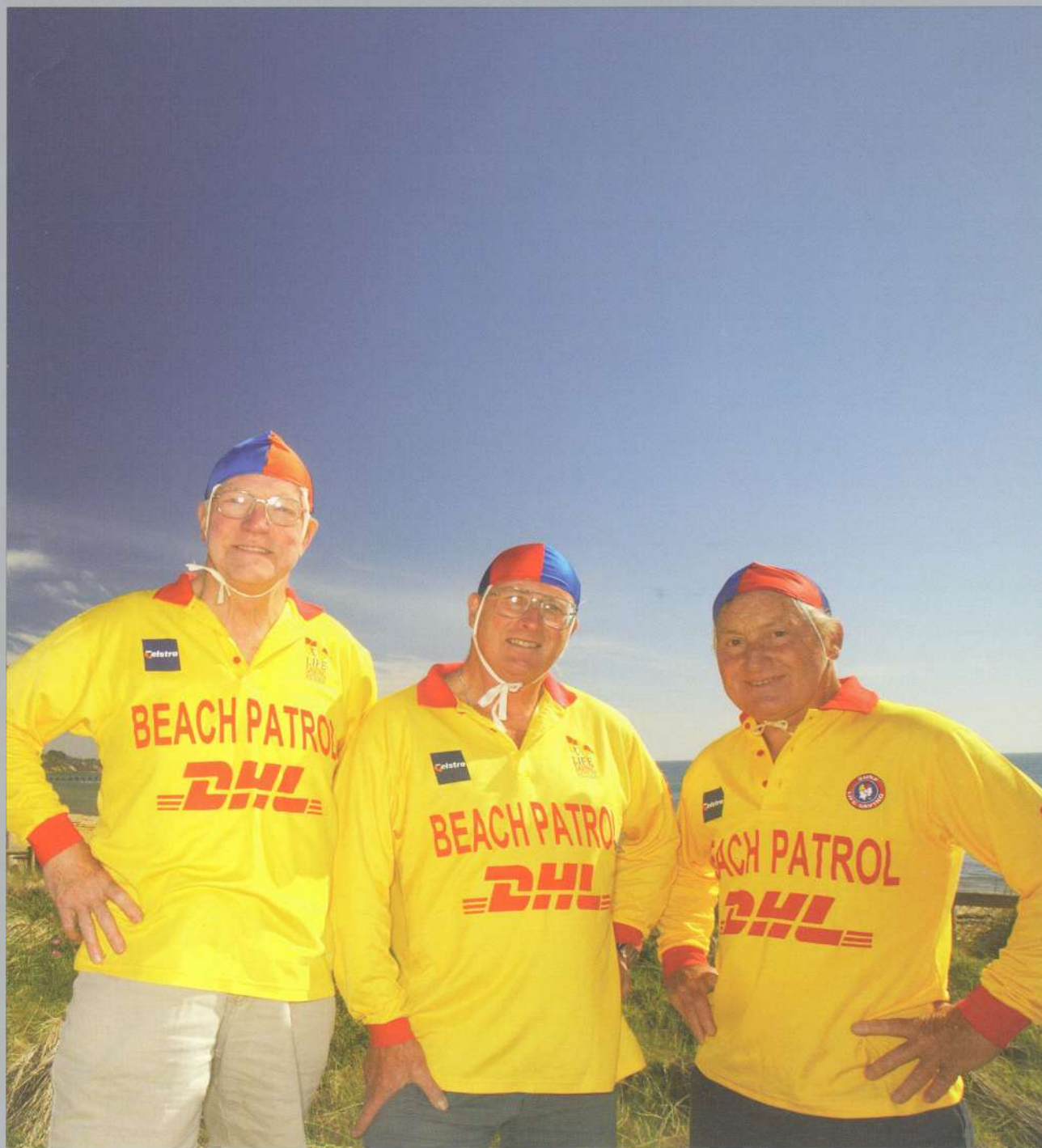

Financial Summary

Financial Results and Review of Operations

The financial activities for the first two years of Life Saving Victoria have included a number of unique and one-off transactions. The consolidated surplus for the economic entity for 2005-06 was \$4,927,319 (\$2,250,454 in 2004-05) and comprised the following elements (see Figure 1).

As the table below demonstrates the reported surplus is distorted by several non-recurring transactions and therefore cannot be used as a likely guide for future outcomes.

In the following statements the economic entity includes all financial transactions for Life Saving Victoria and related entities which includes the management of the Dandenong Oasis. The figures for the parent entity exclude the Dandenong Oasis financial transactions.

Throughout 2005-06 the business operations were conducted from the Oakleigh premises while work continued on the construction of the new Education and Training and Headquarters Building at Sandridge Beach.

The Board of Directors determined not to tender for the ongoing management of the Dandenong Oasis Aquatic and Leisure Centre and the contract concluded on 30 June 2006. A transmission of business to the Victorian YMCA occurred on 1 July 2006 and the majority of staff transferred to the new Centre Manager. Subsequent to the transmission of the business agreement was reached with the new Centre Manager for the sale of the majority of the non-current assets.

Significant Changes in the State of Affairs

On 1 July 2005 Royal Life Saving Society Australia Victoria Branch Inc and Surf Life Saving Victoria gifted net assets of \$2,723,331 to Life Saving Victoria Limited. These assets have been recognised as revenue in the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2006 and represent the largest single element of the surplus.

Life Saving Victoria Limited now undertakes the full range of activities that were previously undertaken by the gifting bodies.

Dividends

The Memorandum of Association provides that no income or property of the entity, shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of dividends to the members. Accordingly no dividend has been declared or paid since incorporation.

Subsequent Events

Since the end of the financial year and the date of this report the following significant transaction or events have occurred:

- > The management contract for the Dandenong Oasis Leisure Centre has been completed. This business has been transmitted to a new facility manager. Arising from the completion of the contract has been the sale of certain assets at the centre that were owned by LSV.
- > Practical completion of the new Headquarters building was achieved on 1 August 2006 and occupancy occurred immediately thereafter.
- > A contract had been signed for the sale of the building at 43 Dalgety Street Oakleigh on commercially confidential terms.
